Often called the "Mother of Montana Modernism," Frances Senska had a literal hand in building the first pottery kilns at The Bray as well as developing Montana's first college-level ceramics program in Bozeman. Before taking the position where she would stay for the next 30 vears, she had lived in

Cameroon with her missionary parents, taught drawing and painting at Grinnell College in Iowa, side-studied sculpture and design with a leader of the Bauhaus school, volunteered for service during the war effort, traveled to Europe where she saw Modernist works firsthand, flew Navy planes in non-combat situations, and took a single but pivotal ceramics class with the glamorous Edith Heath of Heath ceramics in San Francisco. From her Central African teachers, she had gained a deep appreciation for utilitarian arts that made creative

use of materials on hand. Despite the wealth of experiences on her way to Montana, the concept of controlling the production and materials of work from start to finish was one of the strongest values she passed along to her famous students Rudy and Lela

The importance of this project at The Bray:

Near the headwaters of the Missouri River, Helena, Montana sits in a valley at the base of the Rocky Mountains. Native Americans have inhabited this valley for more than 12,000 years; historically, it was not the permanent home of any particular tribe as the area was shared by Salish, Crow, Bannock, and Blackfeet tribal members. With eight tribal reservations — though none in Helena — many Native peoples continue to live and work in Montana.

The Bray is internationally renowned for its facilities and its support of emerging and established ceramic artists. However, we acknowledge our history is steeped in primarily Western and Far Eastern clay traditions; there has not yet been a formal and long-term onsite land acknowledgement to Indigenous peoples, and there is currently no space to share and learn Indigenous ceramics. Within the Bray's expansive public sculpture park and grounds, there is currently no formal Indigenous representation.

About the pit firing site:

Designed by Indigneous artists Cannupa Hanska Luger and Raven Halfmoon and based on traditional North American Indigenous designs, this new site will be built for the future and will incorporate new, repurposed and longlasting materials to create a



structure to host pit firing and for Indigenous artists to teach and explore firing techniques, sharing these technologies with The Bray's clay community.

The proposed domed building will measure approx 60' across and 30' high, mirroring the respective artists' ancestral design knowledge, as noted in the Earth Lodge structure of Luger's ancestors. The interior space will be hyper-functional, designed to support what will become a global Indigenous led ceramics program. Spaces for working and learning will surround a pit-fire in the lodge's center; a large open aperture will be in the center that connects earth and sky. Further details on design and construction are in the planning stages.

The Bray's commitment:

The Bray is committed to support the construction of this new site to become the first permanent Indigenous on-site presence; moreover, it will be a living monument to house an ongoing Indigenous clay program — the first Indigenous-designed and run ceramics facility in the region — for which The Bray will actively fundraise, recruit, promote, and support. With the process in motion, the trajectory of this site's construction is estimated to be complete and the site.

Welcome Invited Visiting Artist Sharif Bey



Born as one of twelve children, Sharif Bey was raised in a large African American family in Pittsburgh. While many of the men in his family left school for jobs in industry, Bey had a pivotal experience at the Manchester Craftsmen's Guild (MCG) while attending high school. MCG played a formative role for Bey throughout his teens, giving him a foundation of skills and extensive ceramics-world connections. Shortly after the fall of the

Soviet Union, Bey studied sculpture at The Academy of Fine Arts and Design in Bratislava, Slovakia. Later, he earned his BFA from Slippery Rock University, his MFA from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and PhD (in art education) from Pennsylvania State University. His awards include: The United States Artist Fellowship, The Pollock-Krasner Fellowship, The New York Foundation for the Arts Fellowship, and The J. William Fulbright Scholarship. He is featured in numerous public collections including: The Smithsonian American Art Museum, The Museum of Fine Arts in Houston, The Carnegie Museum, The Columbus Museum, The Everson Museum, and The Westmoreland American
