### **Women's History Month**

This Women's History Month we celebrate the Women of The Bray, who have had a critical impact throughout our history and into the present.

We begin with one of the most influential people of The Bray's history- Frances Senska.

Often referred to as the "Grandmother of Ceramics" in Montana, Frances Senska was a celebrated artist and educator, producing pottery, prints and many notable students. Her teaching career spanning over 30 years, Senska established the ceramics program at Montana State College in the 1940s and taught many young artists, several of whom went on to international renown in the field.



Frances Senska was instrumental in the founding of the Archie Bray Foundation, introducing young Peter Voulkos and Rudy Autio to the Foundation's founders, and helping to stabilize and strengthen the "Pottery in a Brickyard". In addition, Senska literally helped to lay the bricks of the first pottery.

Her own work was functional and of the earth – she dug her clay locally and made her glazes from natural materials, many of them local as well –her surface decoration reflected her love of the surrounding Montana nature as well as her memories from her childhood in Africa. Senska's life partner, Jessie Wilber, chaired the MSU art department and worked with Senska and others to found the Archie Bray Foundation.

"...clay is such a universal medium. Everybody uses it. Kids start working with clay as soon as they can get some in their hands. It's just such an appealing material to work with. And then if you go on a little further and you make something with it that you like, you can put it in the fire and make it permanent; that's good too. You don't have to translate it into something else....You carry through the whole process to the end product yourself." -Frances Senska, 1914-2009

The Archie Bray Foundation recognizes and honors the Indigenous peoples of this region on whose ancestral lands the Foundation now stands.
