

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
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Michelle Im is a Korean American artist working in Queens, New York. Her project 'RATxCHICKS', pronounced as [ratchix] is a project name for her ceramics that is a play on the words 'rachet' and 'rad chicks'. Humor is what drives a lot of the ideas she has for her decorations. In her work, she explores ideological tensions that she experienced growing up in both the United States and South Korea. Creating intricate patterns in her ceramics is in part, a way to marry two diametrically opposed systems of culture- individualism and collectivism. She often pairs motifs that are deliberately out of the ordinary and part of the process is to encapsulate a sense of absurdity in a way that is approachable and inviting to the viewer. She graduated with a degree in Biology and Art from The State University of New York at Buffalo and was named one of Ceramics Monthly 2022 Emerging Artists. Her dream is to one day breed rats

November is Native American Heritage Month

As we celebrate Native American Heritage month, we would like to celebrate the work Indigenous created and led organization IllumiNative.

Created and led by Native peoples, IllumiNative is a new nonprofit initiative designed to increase the visibility of – and challenge the negative narrative about – Native Nations and peoples in American society.

For decades, the lack of representation and information about Native peoples has perpetuated damaging myths and stereotypes. Native peoples rank at or near the bottom of most socio-economic



indicators — such as educational attainment, domestic violence, and poverty — and are often portrayed in popular entertainment, the news media, educational curricula and other influential sources as 'noble savages' of days gone by. But research shows that a more powerful, more accurate, and more inspiring narrative about the contemporary Native experience — one of innovation, creativity, resilience and community — is being overlooked and obscured the negative one.

IllumiNative seeks to change that.

We believe that acknowledging and reflecting upon the contemporary lived experience and history of the Indigenous peoples here in Montana and around the world are essential steps toward creating a more equitable world. The Bray is a nonprofit educational organization dedicated to the enrichment of the ceramic arts, located at 2915 Country Club Ave. in Helena, just 1/3 mile west of Spring Meadow Lake.
